World renown, Grammy award winning R&B artist Jackie Payne Band will perform with guest guitarist Pat Wilder at 9:00 p.m. with Mendo Rhythm & Swing playing from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m.

Born on Sept. 26 1945, Payne first sang professionally at age 13 with the Allen Swing Band out of Atlanta and then an R & B group called The Serenaders. In 1963 he headed to Port Arthur, Texas, where he waxed his first side, "The Ballad Of JFK" as Little Jackie Payne. He served as a warm up act for Sam Cooke, Jerry Butler, Chuck Jackson and Albert Collins to name a few. He also sang with Collins' group. In 1965, Willard Benton, aka "Funky Slim," took Payne to Huey Meanx of Jet Stream Records to cut 8 sides including the regional hit "Go Go Train."

After a stint in the army in 1968, Payne headed to California and worked with Pee Wee Crayton and gigged with his own band for several years. During this time he also sang with the The Johnny Otis Show. Payne continued to play and pay his dues and finally got some more studio time. He contributed vocals to three songs on a Kenny "Blue" Ray disc called "In All My Life" and then cut his first disc for JSP Records.

Music Lovers along the coast are happily looking forward to a piano and cello chamber music concert at the Gualala Arts Center on Sunday, January 17, 4:00 p.m., featuring Roy Bogas, who is undoubtedly Gualala's favorite pianist, and his highly-esteemed cellist friend, Peter Wyrick.

For many years, these musicians have delighted Gualala audiences in a variety of performances, including those of the now-famous Gualala Summer Chamber Music Weekend, featuring the Roy Bogas and Friends piano and string quartet ensemble, which

has been presented in July of every year dating back to 2003.

Roy Bogas received his training in New York and at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. He made his debut with the San Francisco Symphony at age 14, and at age 19 he became the accompanist to Yehudi Menuhin, playing over a hundred concerts with him throughout North and South America. He has also played with Joseph Szigeti and many other well-known artists. In 1962 he was a prizewinner at the second Tchaikovski Competition in Moscow.

He has performed as soloist with virtually every orchestra in Northern California and with many other orchestras in this country and abroad. Mr. Bogas is a professor of music at Holy Names University in Oakland, and is also Principal Solo Pianist for the San Francisco Ballet. An active chamber musician, he is the founder and director of the MasterGuild Series of chamber music concerts at Holy Names.

Peter Wyrick, Associate Principal Cellist of the San Francisco Symphony, was one of the last students of Leonard Rose at Juilliard. He has previously served as Principal Cellist of the Mostly Mozart Festival Orchestra at Lincoln Center, and as Associate Principal Cellist of the New York City Opera Orchestra. He was a member of the acclaimed Ridge String Quartet, whose recording of the Dvorak Piano Quintets with pianist Rudolf Firkusny won the French Diapason d'Or and was nominated for the 1993 Grammy Award for the Best Chamber Music Performance.

He has performed as soloist with the San Francisco Symphony and as chamber musician and soloist with renowned chamber ensembles and orchestras throughout the world. Peter is married to violinist Amy Hiraga, who is also part of the Roy Bogas and Friends ensemble.

"Latin and West Coast Sounds" with the Larry Vuckovich International Sextet plus "Valeriana Quevedo's Song and Dance" is the title of the two part concert on Saturday, January 23, 2010 presented by Gualala Arts Center in association with Fred Adler, KTDE 100.5 FM.

Acclaimed pianist Larry Vuckovich's International Sextet will feature Noel Jewkes (tenor / baritone sax and flute); Pete Yellin (tenor

and alto sax); Buca Necak (upright bass); Akira Tana (drums) and Hector Lugo (percussion).

The exotic south of the border vocalist/dancer, Valeriana Quevedo, will join the group after intermission for a passionate set of Salsa and American song and dance, presented in both Spanish and English.

Set one will feature memorable Vuckovich trio originals plus the famous and beloved early sounds of West Coast jazz. Gerry Mulligan's familiar "Line For Lyons," "Bernie's Tune" and a sublime version of "Nancy with the Laughing Face" coupled with "Young At Heart" (both Sinatra tunes) will showcase the two outstanding saxophonists on classic and irresistible West Coast interweaving and counterpoint.

Vuckovich will unveil his brand new composition "Adler's Allegro & Adagio," written in honor of South Coast jazz concert producer and radio personality, Fred Adler, who will emcee the concert. Adler says of this piece, "It is a deep honor and true delight to have an original composition written and performed for me by



such an accomplished and talented pianist/composer as Larry Vuckovich, played along with this formidable sextet."

Vocalist/dancer, Valeriana Quevedo, has performed for twelve years in the legendary San Francisco revue, "Beach Blanket Babylon," portraying countless characters



including Cher, Princess Diana and, of course, Carmen Miranda (adorned with fruit basket hat and all!). She has served as assistant choreographer for the city's long running and record setting production. Quevedo has brilliantly performed around the globe for decades.

The evening will conclude with the hard-driving and spirited Lionel Hampton Orchestra's trademark number "Flying Home." Tenor man Pete Yellin took the famous main solo with the later Hampton big bands, and will recreate that magic on this version at the Gualala Arts Center.

The Dolphin Gallery presents an exhibit of Geoffrey Bolt's hand-crafted baskets and Jan Krunic's paintings from the opening Saturday, January 2 through February 3.

Geoffrey Bolt is a retired physician who practiced in Sebastopol, CA. When he retired, he studied with the famous Sebastopol wood turner, Chuck McLaughlin. From the very first lesson, Geoffrey felt that he had found a creative outlet that he enjoyed and could achieve some measure of satisfaction in doing. There was a great deal of pleasure in taking a rough block of wood and turning it into a thing of beauty such as a bowl, vase, goblet or lidded box.

After taking a class in Pine needle basket making from Gerda Randolph at the Gualala Arts Center, he realized that it would be possible to use some of his small turned bowls as a base for the pine needle baskets and he now uses a turned wood base for almost all his "hybrid" baskets. The baskets are beautiful as objects, with form and color from the waxed linen thread, beads and other embellishments that are added.

Jan Krunic is an accomplished athlete, received a Physical Science degree from California State University Long Beach in 1970 and taught math and physical education for 10 years. While traveling in 1980, she discovered a beautiful home with land in Annapolis and immediately relocated to the North. I established a successful cleaning business for 16 years.



Upon retiring from my cleaning business in 2000, I moved from Annapolis, CA. to Cloverdale, CA. At this time I decided to pursue my latent artistic talents and joined a drawing class for seniors. I soon discovered the joys of painting with water-based oils on canvas. I recently moved into a technique I developed of India Ink drawings on Yupo paper.

REDWOOD TRANSECT WITH J. MICHAEL FAY, National Geographic Explorer-in-Residence

Monday, January 25, 2010, 7:00 p.m. Admission is \$5



Michael Fay, National Geographic Explorer-in-Residence The Redwood Forest Foundation and Gualala Arts are proud to sponsor an evening of slides and conversation with J. Michael Fay, a Wildlife Conservation Society conservationist and National Geographic Society Explorer-in-

Residence, at the Gualala Arts Center on Monday, January 25, 2010, from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.

Fay played a lead role in developing the October, 2009 National Geographic magazine cover story, Redwoods: The Super Trees and the recent documentary: EXPLORER: Climbing Giant Redwoods.

Fay completed his Redwood Transect last year - a 2,000-mile trek through the redwood region. Fay walked the length of California's mythic redwood range, from Big Sur to Chetco, Oregon. He and Lindsey Holm took pictures and detailed notes on their 11-month trek, recording wildlife, plant life, fish, and the condition of the forest and streams.

Fay believes it is possible to maximize both timber production and the many ecological and social benefits that working forests provide. Talking to loggers, foresters, biologists, environmentalists, local residents and timber company executives, they found that redwood forests are at a historic crossroads - a time

when society can embrace a different kind of forestry that could benefit people, wildlife and perhaps even the planet. While Fay's message is sometimes dire, "This planet is in peril," he sees signs of hope in a new form of forestry that is developing on the North Coast.

This is an opportunity to talk with Mike and view his slides, which reveal the condition of North Coast forests and streams and the hidden world at the top of 370-foot redwoods - a vibrant ecosystem alive in the redwood canopy. Fay is advocating with public officials, commercial interests and the region's residents for a Marshall Plan for the redwood region.

This is an opportunity for you to decide how you want to be involved in the environmental and economic revitalization of the redwood region.

The Redwood Forest Foundation (RFFI) conserves working forestlands as a way to protect biodiversity, mitigate climate change, improve the local economy and achieve social equity. Birding and Unrivaled Game Watching in Southern Africa with Bryant and Diane Hichwa

Monday, January 11, 2010, 7:00 p.m. Admission is \$5

Join the Hichwas for a visual presentation of Southern Africa. Their safari combined birding with unrivaled game watching in some of Africa's most remarkable wildlife areas of South Africa, Namibia, Zambia, and Botswana, all captured by Bryant, a semi-professional nature photographer.

The Sea Ranch couple visited game reserves in the "bush" of northern South Africa, vast and pristine Namibian highlands, ochre-colored dunes of the Namib Desert, lagoons of the Skeleton Coast, game filled waterholes of Etosha National Park, backwaters of the Okavango Delta and the savanna of Chobe National Park on the Zambezi River. All provided incredible contrasts.

In Makulu Makete, a private reserve in the northern South African bush known for its "rewilding" of cheetahs and hundreds of baobab trees, they observed Wild Dogs (Painted Wolves), an elusive and endangered species that is making a comeback where



protected.

Habitat variety through the countries allowed them to see Blue Crane, Monteiro's Hornbill, Malachite and Great Kingfisher, Yellow-billed Stork and Pearl-spotted Owlet among many other birds.

The safari combined views of beautiful scenery with waterholes and rivers that draw in mammals such as Roan and Sable antelope, Kudu, cheetah, and black rhino for which these regions are famous. They end their visual safari in Livingston, Zambia, marveling at one of the Seven Wonders of the Natural World, the spectacular Victoria Falls.

Diane and Bryant Hichwa, past presidents of Madrone Audubon, travel extensively, photographing and enjoying the natural world. Bryant is known for his popular lectures on the physics behind musical instruments, but this lecture will be his first on wildlife.

We all know someone with diabetes, glaucoma, cataracts or macular degeneration; we all think about our own vision impairment as we grow older. So Dr. Robert Nelson's talk on "The Aging Eye" is an excellent way to learn more about these vision related ailments that plague so many in their later years.

Of the 18 million diabetics in the U.S., over half will have related eye complications. Over half of those over eighty will have cataracts or cataract surgery and it is the leading cause of blindness in the world. Glaucoma strikes over 3 million and is the second leading cause of blindness in the country. Macular degeneration is the major cause of vision loss in those over sixty. Of the 10 million Americans who are visually impaired, 6.5 million are over 65.

"Doctor Bob," as he is known at the Redwood Coast

Medical Services office in Gualala, will talk about these vision problems, explaining what they are, what causes them, and how patients and their family deal with these age-related problems, which all of us who live long enough will confront.

Born in Brooklyn and a graduate of Columbia University, Dr. Bob practiced for thirty-six years in Napa and continues to teach ophthalmology residents at the California Pacific Medical Center. He is a fellow of the American Academy of Ophthalmology and the American College of Surgeons.

This talk should appeal not only to card carrying Medicare seniors, but to anyone interested in learning how to prevent contracting one of these vision-threatening conditions.


