A dynamic duo for two decades, Kim McKee and Ken Willson are life partners that have both been involved in the world of music since childhood. A performer at age five, Kim's earliest focus was on the art of classical music. An interest in her family tree and the traditions stemming from within channeled Kim into the Celtic realm. Her passion and commitment in mastering the dulcimer crowned her National Dulcimer Champion of 2002.

Ken Willson has dabbled in numerous musical genres from bluegrass to good old rock-n-roll—acoustic folk being the constant. A self-taught artist, Ken has a flare for the guitar (whether it's the six-string, Irish Bouzouki or cardboard guitar). These instruments combined with many others make up the unique sound of Willson & McKee. Irish favorites such as hornpipes and jigs are brought to life with the Celtic harp, bodhran (drum), Appalachian dulcimer and the almighty squeeze box!

Paper & book artist Jackie Gardener joins silver jewelry specialist Walt Rush in the February Dolphin Gallery exhibit. You are invited to share in this creative energy by meeting the artists and mingling with members of the community on Saturday, February 7 from 5–7 p.m. Admission is free and complimentary wine and appetizers will be served. The exhibit continues through March 3.

A former interior designer, Jackie Gardener blends over twenty years of design experience with a passion for paper art and collage. Schooled at the University of California, Santa Barbara, Jackie received a Bachelor of Arts in Art and later obtained a Bachelor of Science in Interior Design at San Jose State. She spent many years designing for medical facilities and later channeled her energies into paper & book art after her retirement in 1997.

Jackie's exhibit entitled "New Directions" is a reflection of the work that she has created within the last year- specifically collages. Comprised of varying types of paper (handmade, postcards, paste papers, etc.), her pieces are adorned with a spectrum of ornamentation—from feathers and buttons to ticket stubs and shells.



Artist Walt Rush combines years of experience as a gold and silversmith with a uniquely creative mind in his show "Love Actually is...Jewelry." Originally born in Northern California, Walt's earliest influences were his parents, both of whom were involved in the arts. After an eastern exodus, he found himself back on the West Coast in 2000 and has claimed Irish Beach his home.



Walt has worked with several metals including platinum, silver, white and yellow gold. His hands serve as the main tools for manipulating these metals in conjunction with carving waxes and forging. By adding precious gemstones to his pieces, Walt creates alluring jewelry and sculptures with an "organic look."

With thirty years experience as the owner of an eastern coast jewelry store, Rush has completed jobs ranging from antique restoration to custom jewelry design. He has a definite idea as to the purpose of his creations: "Jewelry should be an attribute to the human body as a painting is to a room or a sculpture is to that special place in a home, building or yard. My works-of-art in jewelry or treasured precious metal sculptures are for the discerning in taste."

It seemed like a good idea to interview the "pioneers," and Bob Hocker approved the plan.

I had no idea how to do general editing or how to add titles and music, elevate sound, use transitions, or enhance color, but I knew that such a project would force me to learn. With encouragement and offers to help from Bill and Betty Jane Darling's children and grandchild who are professionals in the field of video productions, the years of trial and error began. Gualala Arts Lecture Series will present an informative lecture by Jean Duffy on Monday, February 2 at 7:30 p.m. entitled "Navigating the Health Care System." A \$5 donation is appreciated for admission.

Jean Macpherson Duffy is a graduate of Stanford University and has been a public health nurse and a professor of nursing. She was the first Registered Nurse to be elected to the California state assembly. While in office, she passed the nation's toughest drunk driving legislation. The Jean M. Duffy award for legislative initiative in that field is awarded annually in many states.

Twice a breast cancer survivor, Jean has written a book about her recent experiences with the health care system, with doctors and other health care workers, and with the many decisions she faced during her treatment. Her talk will focus on the necessity of every individual's responsibility for—and full participation in—their own health care decisions.

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Call for Artists: “The Chair Affair” — Anything Goes!

- *Saturday, March 20*

Planning is underway for a dazzling fundraiser for the Gualala Arts Center, with Saturday, March 20 as the date set for a fun-filled gala & live auction. The focus of the evening will be the humble chair, elevated to works of art by members of the community. Do you have an unwanted chair that you could give a new lease on life by re-creating it as a work of art? Or do you have an idea for a new take on the chair theme? It could be a chair, bench, stool, rocker, etc. The only requirement would be that the finished piece must be able to support a person in a sitting position. The chairs could be stripped down, dressed up, beautiful, outrageous, humorous, tacky, wild or wacky. Anything goes, as long as you can sit on it!

The entire community will be invited to join us for “The Chair Affaire,” a gala evening of noshing and previewing the art chairs, followed by a raucous live auction. Each chair will be brought to the auction podium, and its creator will be invited to say a few words about the work of art, because art is more interesting when you know more about it. Then the bidding will begin (you can bid on your own work if you like) and bidding wars will be encouraged, with all the proceeds going to Gualala Arts.

We’ll also make direct contact with each school, church, service organization, and major business in the area, asking them to create chairs too, so that we get a broad representation from all sectors of our community. We hope that the chair theme may appeal to people who don’t usually consider



themselves artists, but may find this a fertile medium to express their talents. How about a Cowboy Chair, or a Quilt Bench, or maybe a Painted Lady, Musical Rocker, Construction Lift, Bird Perch, Food Fantasia, Armchair Explorer, Business Bar Stool, Stadium Seat, Hardware Hangout, or even the ubiquitous Committee Chairperson!!



There is one more key element that will be essential to the success of The Chair Affaire, and that is our Food Artists. We will be issuing a “Call to Artists” for those who create in the culinary medium, to donate sweet or savory finger foods for the Gala. Each dish will be presented as the work of art that it is, with a title card featuring the name of the creation, the artist’s name, and the key ingredients listed as the “medium.” We intend to eat them rather than sell them, but they will provide the energy boost that the party crowd will need to bid often and bid high at the auction!
