David Gans and Special Guests to Perform

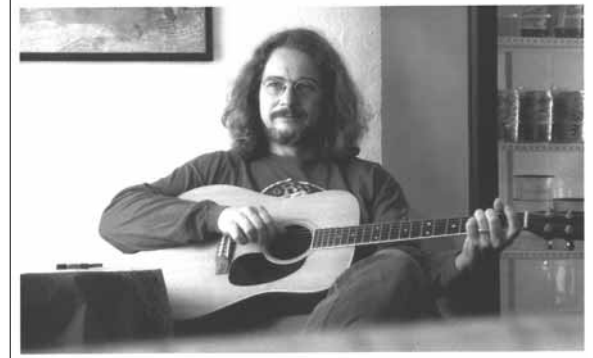

On Saturday, October 9, Gualala Arts' Sea Tones Series presents David Gans and special guests Erik Rawlins and Rik Elswit. Show time is 7:30 p.m., and admission is only \$10! Get your tickets now at Gualala Arts Center, the Dolphin Gallery, or reserve by telephone at 884-1138. Join us for an evening of rockin' music with a Bay Area icon.

Gans started out as a musician in 1970, playing guitar, writing songs, and performing both as a soloist and as a member of various bands around the Bay Area. Then, in an unprecedented career change, he became a music journalist. It usually happens the other way around, and it's almost never successful. But Gans' journalism career was quite opposite—he worked for BAM, a free San Francisco-based magazine, and for Jann Wenner's *Record* from its beginning to its end. He was also music editor of *Mix* magazine for a while. As he says, "Writing for music magazines gave me access to musicians and producers and record company publicists. I got a million-dollar education from interviewing Leo Fender, Randy Newman, Fleetwood Mac, Steve Goodman, T-Bone Burnett, Warren Zevon, Ted Templeman, and people like that. I spent time in recording studios, learned how the music business operates, rode in limos with the Doobie Brothers, got lots of records for free, and got paid for all of it."

Magazine work gave way to book work, and in 1985, his first book, *Playing in the Band: an Oral and Visual Portrait of the Grateful Dead* (co-authored with Peter Simon), was published to much acclaim. While he was working on his second book, *Talking Heads: The Band and Their Music*, he produced a show for a Grateful Dead radio show on a local station, and discovered he liked doing it. Before long, his Grateful Dead Radio Hour was syndicated on dozens of stations across the United States.

During this period he realized that he'd gotten away from his first love—actually making



music. In the mid-90's, Gans realized it was time to get to work.

And get to work he did. Using everything he'd learned about the music industry as a journalist, everything he'd learned about networking from the incredible Grateful Dead web of fans, and everything he'd always known about the kind of music he liked, he resumed performing and writing songs in earnest.

Gans seized every opportunity to tour, often for weeks at a time. Over the past five years he has appeared all over the United States. He's a regular at the Suwannee SpringFest and MagnoliaFest, both held at the Spirit of the Suwannee Music Park in Live Oak, FL, and has appeared at the High Sierra Music Festival in northern California.

David hasn't given up the Dead—the program still airs weekly, and he co-produced Arista Records' gold-certified 1999 Grateful Dead box set *So Many Roads (1965–1995)*.

"I've learned a lot from the Grateful Dead," he notes. "They made some truly great songs, and their performances had a narrative structure that used their own songs and the songs of others to tell a story that each listener heard in his own way. I have discovered over time that this is true of my performances as well; I write songs, and choose covers, that further my own narrative, which I am discovering as it unfolds."

After a long hibernation, his singing, song-writing, and guitar playing have emerged to make him a singular artist with his own strong identity. He's David Gans, and you

NEW SCULPTURE

Wednesdays, October 13–November 17 (six weeks), 10 a.m.–4 p.m. — Judith has been teaching an extremely popular sculpture class at the Arts Center for 10 years as part of the Santa Rosa Junior College Art department. Two years ago, due to extreme budget cuts, the college cancelled the class. Gualala Arts has stepped in, making it possible for local students and artists to study with Judith once again. This class is open to all levels and will offer guidance through a variety of sculptural experiences including: 1) Hand building, sculptural, and low-fire glazing and firing techniques in clay. (Gualala Arts has an excellent large electric kiln.) Working from the model to complete in clay or to use as a study for work in cast stone or other media. 2) Simple mold-making in plaster and/or latex. 3) Creating waxes to be used for casting in bronze. 4) Carving cast stone: making outdoor sculpture by carving a special cement mixture with simple hand tools while it is still soft. You can make sculpture, containers, garden furniture, and/or fountains. or you can learn to make larger, lighter weight hollow pieces by working on an armature. Students may choose to concentrate on one or explore a variety of these processes. The class costs \$150 and is limited to the first 10 applicants. Materials and model fees as applicable. Iron Work and Oil Painting on Exhibit in the Elaine Jacob Foyer

On Saturday, October 16, from 5 to 7 p.m., Gualala Arts presents the work of artists Gert Rasmussen and Teresa DiMeola in their opening reception. Enjoy conversation and mingle with the artists as you enjoy complimentary wine and appetizers in the Elaine Jacob Foyer. There is no charge for admission; the exhibit continues through November 9.

Born in Copenhagen, Denmark, Gert Rasmussen's first experience with art was on a large blackboard that his parents had placed in their living room. At age 15, he served as an apprentice to a local blacksmith and illustrated for two Danish underground papers.

After completing two years at the Hasselbach School of Decoration, Gert moved to Sweden and worked as a blacksmith for Kosta-Boda Glass Company making decorative ironwork for artists such as Bertil Wallin and Carl Kihlberg.

In 1997, he moved to California, and after a few years in the vine growing business, returned to drawing, painting, and blacksmithing. Gert, a Mendocino resident, also works with Tom

Brown at the Mendocino Art Center, creating bronze and cast iron. In 2002, he was awarded both 1st and 2nd place for his decorative ironwork at the Boonville Fair. At this year's Art in the Redwoods Festival, he received a Judges Award for his ironwork entry.

Teresa DiMeola started drawing and painting at the age of seven when her grandparents, Carmel residents and active supporters of the early art scene there, sent her to study with one of the local artists. At the age of nine, she enrolled in the California College of Arts and Crafts, and years later began to pursue a college career and a degree in Mechanical Engineering. Following her graduation, Teresa continued to study art wherever her technical career took her.

After five years of study, Ms. DiMeola was granted a full scholarship to the esteemed Art Student's League in New York City, where she again combined art with technology by concurrently enrolling in a Master's program in Computer Science. Following a decade in Denmark, and work that was almost exclusively abstract,

Concert Series to Present Ensemble Phoenix

The Gualala Arts Concert Series is pleased to present the outstanding string trio Ensemble Phoenix in a program of chamber music on Sunday, October 10, 4 p.m., at the Gualala Arts Center. A previous performance by Ensemble Phoenix in Gualala, in January 2002, was met with enthusiastic acclaim, and the coastal music community is eagerly anticipating the return of this ensemble.

The Independent Coast Observer wrote in a review of the previous Phoenix concert "The soaring violin was beautifully supported by the viola and the deep-throated warmth of the cello. We were treated to an exposition of string playing both subtle and expressive."

The October concert will include the Schubert String Trio D 471, the Beethoven String Trio in G major op. 9 no. 1, the Zoltan Kodaly Duo for Violin and Cello op. 7, and the Appalachia Waltz by Mark O'Connor.

The ensemble, originally named the Phoenix Trio, was formed in 1993 by Cellist Sarah Fiene in San Francisco. The group started by presenting annual three-performance concert series at the Mountain View Center for the Performing Arts and at Temple Emanu-El in San Francisco, along with performances elsewhere in the state and country. Since 1999, the ensemble's primary venue has been the beautiful sanctuary of the Valley Presbyterian Church in Portola Valley. In 2000, the group renamed itself the Ensemble Phoenix to reflect a

new diversity in both player composition and repertoire. The group now consists



of a handful of musicians, performing in various combinations for different appearances, playing traditional repertoire as well as new music, striving to integrate past and present.

The Gualala concert will present the ensemble in trio form, featuring the same players who appeared here in 2002: Dawn Harms, violin; Anna Kruger, viola; and Sarah Fiene, cello. Each of the three is a highly-accomplished performer with impressive musical credentials and experience, having directed, performed, and recorded with outstanding orchestras and ensembles throughout the world. In addition to their other musical activities, each has founded a chamber music ensemble: As mentioned above, Sarah Fiene is the founder and artistic director of the Ensemble Phoenix; Dawn Harms is the founder and conductor of the Elixir Chamber Orchestra; and Anna Kruger is a founder of the award-winning Lark Quartet.

Tickets for the Gualala concert are \$15 each. Children ages 7 through 17 are admitted free. Advance tickets are available at the Gualala Art Center or at the Dolphin Gallery in Gualala. If not

Acoustic Blues by Hawkeye Herman

- *Saturday, October 30, 7:30 p.m.*

The Sea Tones Series welcomes back guitarist Hawkeye Herman to Gualala Arts Center on Saturday, October 30, at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are \$12 and are available at Gualala Arts Center, the Dolphin, or by calling 884-1138.

With well over 35 years of performing experience, Michael "Hawkeye" Herman exemplifies the range of possibilities in acoustic blues, and personifies versatile musicianship, originality, and compelling artistry as a blues storyteller. His dynamic performances have won him a faithful following, and he leads a very active touring schedule of performances at festivals, concerts, school programs, and workshops. Hawkeye performs a wide variety of traditional blues, ballads, swing, and original tunes, on six-string and twelve-string guitar, and is an adept and exciting practitioner of slide guitar and slide mandolin. His music has been included in video documentaries and in three hit theatrical productions, and his solo CD, *Blues Alive!*, released in 1998, was greeted by rave reviews and greatly increased the demand for his live performances at major blues and folk festivals. His newest CD, *It's All Blues To Me!*, was released in May of 2004.

As a teenager, Hawkeye discovered a broad variety of blues music in late night radio broadcasts. He got his first guitar in 1959 at the age of fourteen, and was performing live two years later. Seeking to broaden his musical horizons, he relocated to the San Francisco Bay area in 1968. He sought out, and learned at the feet of many icons of the blues, including: Son House, Brownie McGhee, Bukka White, Mance Lipscomb, Furry Lewis, Lightin' Hopkins, John Jackson, K.C. Douglas, and Sam Chatmon. He became a staple in

the Bay Area blues scene as both a solo artist and a back-up guitarist and worked with Charles Brown, Haskell "Cool Papa" Sadler, Sonny Rhodes, Jimmy McCracklin, Buddy Ace, Charles Houf, Little Joe Blue, Boogie Jake, and many others.

Hawkeye began touring outside of California in 1984, and has performed at blues and folk festivals, and in concert, across the US/Canada and Europe.

His 1989 album, *Everyday Living*, featuring Charles Brown and Cool Papa, received much critical acclaim. His song, *The Great Flood of '93*, has been used on the sound-tracks of two video documentaries on that Midwest disaster, and has been included in a compact disc anthology of singer/songwriters produced by the New York based music magazine, *Fast Folk*.

Hawkeye has provided musical soundtracks for a number of video productions, most recently, *Tying Bob Quigley's Signature Flies / Volume One* (Pegasus Productions).

Hawkeye served for six years on the Board of Directors of the Blues Foundation in Memphis, and was chairperson of the Foundation's

Photography and Porcelain at the Dolphin Gallery

The Dolphin Gallery invites you to celebrate artists Owen Kahn (photography) and Lynn Wood (porcelain) at their opening on Saturday, October 2, from 5–7 p.m. Gratis wine and hors d'oeuvres will be served, and admission is free. The exhibit can be enjoyed through November 3.

Owen Kahn has been a fine art photographer for thirty years and has a passion for capturing the odd fleeting moments and serendipitous events that occur in the world. He believes photography is the art form best suited to preserve these moments that pass so quickly. When viewing Owen's work, people often ask “Does this place truly exist?” or “Is this real?” The artist finds this to be a testament to the unique viewpoint and vision that he brings to photographic work.

Using a variety of film formats from 35 millimeter to four by five inch, Owen has created a unique body of photographic work in color as well as black and white. This varied exhibit will include photographs of landscapes, barns, people, old buildings and unusual and strange places. For more information about this artist, visit www.owenkahn.com.

Lynn Wood has been working with clay for over 20 years. Currently, all of her work is produced in porcelain; a medium that she finds suits both her style and technique.

In the tableware series, Lynn explores the surface using clay and glaze decorations, remembering that food, function, and form must come together in a complimentary way. In the textured series, the vases are worked from a blank slab of clay. All items in this series utilize textured fragments of clay pieced together to form a whole. These pieces have practical function, but her goal is for them to be sculptures in their own right.
