## It's Here! 44th Annual Art in the Redwoods Festival

### FRIDAY, AUGUST 19

Once again the Art in the Redwoods Festival (AIR) returns to Gualala Arts Center for the 44th annual event. What began among the redwoods on Gualala ridge in 1961 has grown to a two-day attraction for thousands. This popular weekend event will repeat the successful formula of past years, with some new twists!

AIR veterans will see familiar food and drink booths, returning musical groups, and the Art in the Redwoods Dinner. But there will also be some new performers and exhibitors as well. So be sure to save some time between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Saturday, August 20, and Sunday, August 21, to attend what *VIA Magazine* (July–August 2005) calls a “prestigious” event. Admission on Saturday is \$6 with kids admitted free, and for the first time this year, Gualala Arts is offering a two-for-one admission on Sunday!

Visitors to the Champagne Preview and Pre-Sale on Friday night from 5 to 7 p.m. will have an opportunity to purchase artwork before the official start of the festival. Friday evening includes the Judges' Critique of hundreds of pieces of fine artwork in 16 media categories, judged this year by Consuelo Jimenez Underwood, Bob Nugent, and John LeBaron. Following the

Judges Critique is the annual Art in the Redwoods Dinner, where revelers will enjoy a gourmet dinner and a selection of fine wines. The Gualala Arts' Volunteer of the Year will be announced on Friday night as well. The \$50 cost includes admission to all of Friday night's festivities: Champagne Reception, Judges' Critique, and the Art in the Redwoods dinner. (Dinner tickets MUST be purchased in advance—there are limited seats.) Those who wish to attend only the Champagne Preview and Judges' Critique may pay a \$6 admission fee at the door.

This year's dinner menu features a double entree of blackened salmon and chicken morel as well as salad, vegetables, potatoes, dessert, and an assortment of wines to enhance each course. The dinner sells out quickly, so buy your tickets now by calling 884-1138 or visit the Arts Center or the Dolphin Gallery and Shop.

Joan Jordan, and Ellen Soule. Jean Lebbert and her sister Janet Venerella of Lodi will join the group for this special performance.

The Ernest Bloch Handbell Ringers will perform in the amphitheater at 11 a.m. on Saturday and conclude the performances at 3 p.m. on Sunday. This group, which began with just four ringers, is well-known to coastal residents. Our coast had been without bells for a time when Sita Milchev's mother, Lucienne Dimitroff, suggested to Sita that the family purchase a set of English Handbells using funds from the estate of Sita's grandfather, composer Ernest Bloch. Lois Pine, Walt Ratcliff, and Claire Skilton were early enthusiasts, along with Sita, and kept the bells ringing for many years, to the delight of coast residents. In its current reincarnation, the Ernest Bloch Handbell Ringers began playing in 1998. The group quickly grew and when the bells were heard at one Fourth of July parade in Point Arena, they were honored with the Grand Prize. Since then the bell ringers have performed at Art in the Redwoods, at St. Paul's Methodist Church, and at various concerts and functions. For the past three years the ringers have performed a Christmas concert benefiting the Coast Community Library. Meeting every Monday at the home of Richard and Jeanne Jackson, this group of fourteen ringers delights in playing a wide range of music.



Two new acts for Art in the Redwoods are Grupo Ilucion and Jenn August. Grupo Ilucion, a cumbia/salsa band, consists of Sergio Orozco, Francisco Orozco, Alfreda Orozco, and Frederico Perez from Manchester. Their lively Latin beat begins at 10:30 a.m. on Sunday in the amphitheater. Veteran festival performer Jenn August makes her AIR debut in the amphitheater at 2:15 on Saturday. Her folk-rock music presents a message in a style that appeals to a wide audience. "Think Dave Matthews meets Ellen Degeneres," she says.

Children have their own special entertainment at Art in the Redwoods—sponsored by Four-eyed Frog book store is Storytelling for Kids in the Fairy Ring behind the main building at noon each day. In addition, Gualala Arts will host a children's arts and crafts booth, where, under adult supervision, kids can use available materials to create their own art to take home.

The grounds will be filled to the brim with vendor booths offering a host of items including jewelry, ceramics, wood, tiles, weavings, specialized apparel, leather goods, photographs, textiles, and artwork. Service clubs and local businesses will set up barbecue, beverage, baked goods, and ice cream booths. A new addition is Mexican cuisine by Laura's Tacqueria of Gualala.

This year's beautiful quilt, "Earl's Quilt" is in memory of architect and artist Earl V. Carlson. The quilt is a queen/king size mix of greens, oranges, browns, and other earth-toned colors. Other raffle prizes include six bottles of 2005 44th annual Art in the Redwoods signature series wine (only two cases were produced for us!); "Haiku," an open edition iris giclee print (the first in a series of artwork to be produced by the Megan Rose Foundation from the original works of Megan Rose Mauldin); jewelry by Ling-Yen Jones; a tile by Marji Ingersoll; a painting by Bruce Jones, and more original works by artists to be announced! Raffle tickets are \$2 each, seven for \$10 or 15 for \$20. Proceeds from the annual quilt raffle benefit the Gualala Arts Scholarship Program.

The Art in the Redwoods Festival has one more important attraction—the magnificent display of fine art throughout the building. Up to 420 pieces will be on display—most of them for sale. For those unable to attend the festival, these works will remain on display through September 10. The Gualala Arts Center is open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and on weekends from noon to 4 p.m. Admission is free.

## Wood Creations Exhibit Review by Merilyn Lafferty

*Through August 7*

Not to be missed is the new exhibit, "Wood Creations," which opened at Gualala Arts Center on July 9. Elegantly displayed in the foyer and gallery, there is a sense of serenity and balance in the relationship of one piece to the other.

The woodblock prints of Micah Schwabero, which are hung on the gallery walls, provide a visual backdrop of landscapes intense with the color of sky, water, and land as their shadows play off each other. Schooled in Japan, Schwabero incorporates the moku-hanga method of carving his blocks and saturating them with colors. He has perfected his technique to such a level that one lingers before each piece to admire the intricacy of line, the chosen pigments, and the beauty of land and sea as captured in the vision of this gifted artist whose works reside in collections in different parts of the country.

Mounted on pedestals are turned bowls that reveal the natural grain of the wood, chosen by the artist for its uniqueness. In a case lie four tiny feathers of wood, subtly painted, that inspire awe in their intricacy. Carved figures of animals and birds, some done with humor, evoke a smile in the viewer. In one corner of the gallery is a Japanese setting of unique chairs and a free-form coffee table, which are arranged beneath a curving-wood floor lamp, sculptural, but still functional.

Rocking chairs, tables, and beds, oh my. Beneath the soaring glass windows of the foyer is an arrangement of furniture that reflects the craftsmanship of the individual wood workers. A ginkgo leaf image tops one side table; wine bottle racks are near by. The scene is completed with two wood collages; a curved rocking chair that is slender, but supportive; a chair and side table of

found wood; and then, in one corner, is a fantasy that became reality in a medieval castle bed. The turreted headboard frames an armored knight charging on his steed. The trompe l'oeil painting on wood transforms into stones of castle walls.

Cabinets on each side of the headboard, with drawers under the bed, provide all the necessary elements of a bedroom, thus providing an economy of space in a smaller room.

This exhibit has raised inquiries about establishing a woodworking interest group at Gualala Arts. The group could include all phases of woodworking with a special emphasis on furniture, carving, and turning. If you would like to learn more, sign up at the Arts Center and you will be notified of the first meeting.

## 13th annual Studio Discovery Tour

*Saturdays and Sundays, September 3, 4, 10, & 11, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.*

Two wonderful weekends of art await you as the North Coast Artists' Guild presents its annual Studio Discovery Tour—two weekends in a row, September 3–4 & 10–11. This year, 48 local artists will open their private, working studios to the public, answer questions, provide demonstrations, and offer their original creative artwork for sale. Every studio is different, each stop unique.

This is your chance to meet the artists and view a wide array of original paintings, ceramics, sculptures, jewelry, fountains, iron works, weavings, glass art, textiles, photography, and paper works. Studios will be open from Kruse Ranch through Sea Ranch, Gualala, Anchor Bay, Point Arena, Manches-

ter, Albion, and Little River.

This fun-filled adventure is a free self-guided tour along Highway 1, to be enjoyed at your own leisurely pace. Directional signs will help along the way and the free brochure with a description of each artist and a detailed map make it a cinch to find the studios you will most want to see. (The map is a must to visit Sea Ranch artists since signage is limited.) Gualala Arts Center will kick off this event with a reception on Friday, September 1, from 5–7 p.m. in the foyer with a special display of each artist's work and will have the brochures and maps on hand. ## Creative Writing Contest — August 31 Deadline

Entry forms are now available at Gualala Arts Center, the Dolphin Gallery in Gualala, and Coast Community Library in Point Arena for the third annual competition for original, unpublished creative writing. Deadline for entries is August 31.

Gualala Arts, with co-sponsorship of the Rotary Club and The Sea Ranch Foundation, is offering \$1,000 in prize money for the best personal essays and creative nonfiction submitted by full- or part-time Redwood Coast residents from Elk to Timber Cove. This con-

test is open to writers previously unpublished in a book or national periodical (local and school publications okay).

In each of two entry divisions, Adult (over 18) and Youth (13–18), winners will receive a First Prize of \$250 and publication in *The Redwood Coast Review*. Second and third place entries in each category will receive \$150 and \$100, respectively. Winners will be announced and their essays read at the Awards Ceremony on October 24 at the Gualala Arts Center.

The success of the last two years' short-story and poetry contests inspired the organizers to sponsor another creative writing competition this year in a different genre. Eligible writers are encouraged to prepare their best personal essay or creative nonfiction for entry. There is no entry fee. 

## August Featured Exhibit at the Dolphin Gallery

*Opening reception: Saturday, August 6, from 5 to 7 p.m.*

A contrast of the whimsical and the controlled mark the works displayed in August at The Dolphin from August 8 to 31. Diane Van de Carr works with fused glass and Bo Svensson uses captivating photography to evoke responses in the viewer.

"Catch of the Day," with its playful double meaning is a perfect title for this exhibit. The title reflects not only the spontaneity of whatever the ocean provides on a given day, but also the gift of what each day brings. The use of themes means that results often evolve into something quite different from the original concepts.

When Dianne discovered the fusing process in 1985, she embraced the process because it was more spontaneous and less structured than her previous work with stained glass windows. She enjoys the challenge of striving to be creative and at the same time of dealing with the fragility of glass and the restraints of time and temperature. Due to the variables involved, each piece is one-of-a-kind.

Color, texture, and the effect of light on glass are the key elements to her work with diachronic glass, a favorite medium. Vaporizing materials onto sheets of glass in a vacuum chamber create the effect. The microscopic layers interrupt wavelengths of light and the number of ultra-thin coatings produce different colors.

Glass elements that are used for jewelry are wrapped with gold-filled or sterling silver wire and made into earrings, pendants, and pins. Incorporating brass and copper wire into fused glass adds another dimension.

Dianne explains, "I love the fact that my work brings a smile to people's faces, that the color, and feel of glass brings a bit of beauty to the world. People connect with my work and it brings them pleasure. It is important to me that my work is whimsical. There is enough serious art in the world!"

Bo Svensson strives to capture some of the world's most beautiful objects at the perfect moment. His photography consists primarily of architecture, landscapes, and seascapes in both Europe and North America. Since the subject matter is familiar to many viewers, the goal is to capture the precise, magical moment when light and composition create the perfect image.

Each photograph Svensson selects is intended to best reflect his love and respect for nature and for man's proper place in it as observer, partner, and preserver. If successful, the photograph captures a precise moment in time that can provide a timeless enjoyment, which both enhances a space and touches the heart.

On August 6, the public may meet both artists at the opening reception from 5 to 7 p.m. at The Dolphin. The show runs through the end of the month.


