

Arts Center Theater will present *The Little Foxes*, written by Lillian Hellman and directed by Karen Serratoni, on July 24-26, July 31 and August 1-2, 2009 at the Gualala Arts Center.



“The Little Foxes” Lillian Hellman’s 1939 play about the ‘dangers of greedy men and unfettered capitalism’ may have you thinking of Bernie Madoff or Rod Blagojevich,” said Chris Jones of the Chicago Tribune. This incredibly harrowing - and incredibly entertaining - “southern melodrama” concerns


the rapacious Hubbard siblings of Alabama, whose drive for wealth rules their lives.

The *Little Foxes* is a fabulous vehicle for ensemble acting, and **Director Karen Serratoni** has assembled a cast of talented locals to bring this timely play to the Art Center Theater stage. **Kathye Hitt** will bring to life Regina Hubbard Giddens, one of the great anti-heroines of American literature. **Mike Turner** and **Jim Riley** will portray the roles of Regina’s brothers - wily Ben and boorish Oscar. These three characters are the “foxes” who are described in the script as those “who eat the earth and all the little people on it.”

David Skibbins portrays Regina’s husband, Horace, who counters the greed with a sense of honesty and fair play. **Lynne Atkins** assumes the role of Oscar’s wife, the broken spirited

Birdie whose real love centers upon Regina’s young and idealistic daughter, Alexandra (**Olivia Harrison**). Leo (**Mike Mee**) is the spoiled son of Oscar and Birdie. **Donna Yates Johnson** and **Dard Hunter** will play Addie and Cal, faithful long time servants of the family, and **Richard Schimbor**, as Mr. Marshall, is the outsider that ignites the family fireworks.

Perhaps if Lillian Hellman were alive and still writing plays, she would transport her “Little Foxes” to a corporate boardroom. Her fictional turn-of-the-century robber barons bear an all too close resemblance to many of the ruthless and amoral business people who have been exposed recently in the press - those unethical mega businesses that have been ruled by greed and the desire for the quick buck. The only dated thing about the play is Ben Hubbard’s declaration that “there are hundreds of Hubbards sitting in rooms like this throughout the country.” Looking at today’s financial crisis, we must question the modesty of his estimate - “hundreds” seems to be an understatement. Although written in 1939 and set in 1900, *The Little Foxes* is as modern as the nightly news.

The Gualala Chamber Music Series is delighted to present again the Roy Bogas and Friends Ensemble for the seventh annual Summer Chamber Music Weekend, Saturday, July 11th, 7:30 p.m., and Sunday, July 12th, 4:00 p.m., at the Gualala Arts Center.

This traditional weekend of superb performances by pianist Bogas and outstanding musicians from the San Francisco Symphony is the biggest musical event of our concert season. Music lovers are invited to hear either one or both performances, for a fulfilling weekend of superb music performed by top artists.

This year the ensemble has been expanded to include contrabass player Mark Wright, who will play along with the other exciting musicians who have previously performed in Gualala: violinist Axel Strauss, violinist Amy Hiraga, violist Nancy Ellis, cellist Peter Wyrick, and, of course, pianist Roy Bogas.

Roy Bogas Saturday evening's concert will include the Sonata for Violin and Piano by Robert Schumann, the String Trio for Violin, Viola, and Cello in D by Franz Schubert, and The Four Temperaments by Paul Hindemith. Sunday afternoon's concert will follow with the Quartet for Piano and Strings called "The Trout" by Schubert, and the Carnival of the Animals by Saint-Saëns, with verses by Ogden Nash. Both performances will be beautiful, interesting and very enjoyable.



Rex Burnett Invitational Art Exhibit

The Rex Burnett Invitational art exhibit, curated by son John Burnett, combines the three-dimensional appeal of creatively designed cars with the two-dimensional art that depicts them in a memorial tribute to Rex Burnett, an internationally recognized pioneer of cut away drawings featured in "Hot Rod" magazine.

This show is scheduled to open on Saturday, July 11 and should attract a large number of hot rod buffs eager to celebrate the creative genius of Rex, who had been a long-time Sea Ranch resident and patron of Gualala Arts. In the postwar forties he worked as a technical illustrator in the aircraft industry when he participated in the birth of the classic Hot Rod magazine and started drawing for the publication.



The exhibit will feature his cutaway drawings done without the benefit of computers and 3-D CAD programs. These pieces have attracted attention from not only hot rod buffs but also from the art world. One of his most famous drawings is the Pierson Brothers Coupe. Last year the Behring Auto Museum at Blackhawk featured his work in a one-man show and some drawings were part of an exhibit at the Oakland Museum entitled "The Men and Machines of the California Car Culture."

Other current artists whose art incorporates the same subject matter will be included in the show. The exhibit runs through Sunday, August 2 and provides an excellent lead up to Art in the Redwoods.

2009 Gualala Arts Auto Show



About Rozanne Rapozo

Rozanne explains her passion, "My love of photography started the first moment I saw an image emerge from a blank piece of paper in a college darkroom. I was fascinated by the process and soon converted the laundry room to my own darkroom, forever banishing the washer and dryer to the garage. I shot in black and white and spent hours in the darkroom experimenting with different papers and techniques, all the while remaining true to the actual scene that I had captured.

I deeply enjoyed taking photographs; however, my professional career and a busy travel schedule took



precedence and kept me out of the darkroom for the majority of my adult life.

After retiring, I renewed my interest in photography. I picked up my Nikon and haven't put it down since. Unlike the landscapes and still life that held my interest before, I started taking

pictures of the small birds and animals that frequented my garden. I learned the importance of patience, waiting for the right light, understanding animal behavior and just being at the right place at the right time!

About Gerda Randolph

Gerda started the Basketmaking Group at Gualala Arts and is quite an inspiration to many. Gerda explains more about her love of baskets: "The opportunity to be creative and continually learn as I experiment with new ideas and possibilities is what makes my art fun for me. It is always a new adventure. Natural material is my chosen medium, from minerals and rocks formed deep in the earth to soft wool fleeces and yarns to pine needles, wild iris, and other plant fibers, all of these in a wonderful array of textures and colors.

"While I was teaching, I began experimenting with tapestry weaving and thus began my love of working with natural materials. When I left teaching in 2001, I had the time to do more discovering of myself as an artist. I learned to make pine needle baskets and discovered felting."

"When I make a coiled basket or felted piece, the knowledge that I am sharing in ancient processes brings me pleasure. It is not, however, my desire to imitate the beauty of those who have gone before me, but rather to explore my own unique ideas and creativity. When I am working,

my projects often take on a life of their own. I may begin with an idea, but then as I work, I often hear an inner voice that leads me in directions that are new and different. I am learning to listen to that voice and to flow with it."

through Southeast Asia**
with Dave Windsor

Using the best of the over 5,000 pictures he took, Dave Windsor will reveal what he and his wife Janet discovered on their seven-week tour of the majority of countries that made up Indo-China in his lecture on Monday, July 13.



The trip through Cambodia, Laos, Thailand, Myanmar, and Vietnam included explorations of an amazing history, a spectacular landscape, and an exotic world still available at reasonable prices for those with a sense of adventure and a desire for experiences that may soon vanish.

Dave and his wife, Janet, traveled by train, boat, bus, car, tuk tuk and motorcycle taxis. One highlight was a two-day boat trip on the fabled Mekong River that included a visit to Luang Prabang, the capital of ancient Laotian kings. This part of the Mekong Valley includes natural wonders such as the Kuang Si Falls and Pak Ou Caves and the historical Wat Xieng Thong temple and Haw Kham Royal palace.

When working as an analytical chemist for Proctor and Gamble, Dave traveled to Europe and Japan on business and led dive trips around the world as a scuba instructor. Between retirement and Sea Ranch he and Janet had an extended stay in Australia and New Zealand.

In this unique returning workshop, Riley will lead participants through a sequence of simple breathing exercises to promote health, vitality and well being. Learning correct breathing techniques will help one reduce stress levels, increase blood circulation, optimize oxygen intake and develop conscious awareness.

Riley Lee began playing the shakuhachi in Japan in 1971. During the eight years he lived in Japan, he immersed himself in its arts. From 1973 through 1977, he toured internationally as a full-time performer of taiko (festival drums) and shakuhachi with a group of traditional Japanese musicians.



His studies with traditional teachers in Japan have included such peculiar methods as practicing barefoot in the snow, running marathons, and blowing into his flute in blizzards until icicles formed at the shakuhachi's end. In 1980 he became the first non-Japanese to attain the rank of dai shihan (grand master) in the shakuhachi tradition.
