




GIANTS & JAZZ Saturday, April 2, 12:00 noon

A Whale of an Evening! Wednesday, April 6, 6:30 - 9:00 p.m.




Opening Reception: Friday, April 1 at 5:00 p.m. Exhibit remains through May 1, 2011




THE MAY SHOW

Opening Reception: Friday, May 6 at 5:00 p.m. Exhibit remains through May 30, 2011 Gualala Arts Center

The May Show, a juried art exhibit, will return to Gualala Arts Center for the second year with an opening Friday, May 6 from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. through May 30. The purpose of this exhibit is to showcase outstanding visual art and artists without regard to the type of media. There are monetary prizes for the best three works selected for the show; first prize \$1,000, second prize \$750, third prize \$500.

The exhibit is organized with the advice of a number of local artists locally and from the Bay Area and with input from several museum directors and curators. When the exhibit's format was developed, the first question to be answered was "what is art and what kinds of visual art should be allowed into the show." Is art just painting? Sculpture? Photography? What about woodworking? Multimedia?

This year's juror is Stephanie Hanor, Assistant Dean and Director of the Mills College Art Museum. She graduated from Tulane University, received an M.A. from the University of Minnesota, and a PhD. in Art History from the University of Texas at Austin.

Ms. Hanor began her career as Assistant Curator of American and Contemporary Art at the Blanton Museum of Art in Austin and, prior to coming to Mills College, was the Senior Curator at the Museum of Contemporary Art in San Diego.

In addition to judging the show, Ms. Hanor will give a talk as part of the Gualala Arts Lecture Series the night before the opening.






Gualala Arts Young Artist Scholarship program

The Gualala Arts Global Harmony series will host a Tibetan Buddhist Sand Mandala for two days on Tuesday, May 17 and Wednesday, May 18. This auspicious occasion will feature the Gaden Shartse monks, whom many of you may remember from previous visits to the community.

The sand mandala will be constructed from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. each day and then will be ritually "swept" in a ceremony honoring the Buddhist concept of impermanence. Small amounts of sand will be passed out to individuals attending the dissolution and the remaining material will be spread on the grounds of the Gualala Arts Center and into the Gualala River for healing and blessing.

A Consumer's Guide to Herbal Medicine

According to Dr. Karch, the many common herbal medicines are used because they contain compounds called flavanoids, the chemicals that give most plants their color and create the annual display of autumn leaves. Flavanoids are classified as anti-oxidants, which are the body's principle defense against vascular damage and some of the most common forms of eye diseases.

In the depths of the depression, José Clemente Orozco, then living in New York, traveled to Dartmouth to give a lecturedemonstration on fresco painting. The result was a remarkable artistic feat - twenty-six explosive panels in the school's Baker Library entitled "The Epic of American Civilization."

It depicts America's two cultural currents - the indigenous and the European - embodied in the figures of the messianic Mesoamerican deity Quetzalcoatl and Cortez, the European anti-hero. A third, prophetic figure of an apocalyptic Christ

provides the explosive conclusion to this mythic narrative of the Americas.

In February, 2011, at the Annual Members meeting, a summary and consolidation of the recommendations from the "50 Years – 50 More" meeting was presented to the members. The new Board organization was also reviewed and the members voted to approve the changes to the Board.

The new Board of Directors will be meeting face-to-face in an all day retreat on March 21 to review the recommendations, and using a new planning process, the Board will prioritize the objectives for the coming year. These objectives will have owners and measureable results to enable monitoring the progress. The objectives and status will be posted on the Gualala Arts website.

A Message from Our Director

As spring is right around the corner so is our "busy" season here at the Gualala Arts Center. Spring is a time of new growth and possibilities. It was about this time of year when a group of people got together and had a vision to create a wonderful permanent temple dedicated to the arts. Some thought this goal was out of reach, but some visionaries worked for decades to keep that dream alive for our community.
