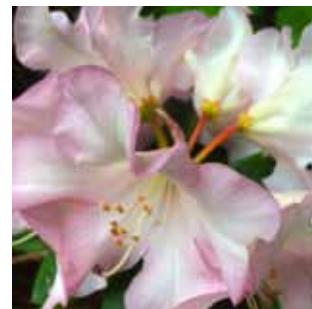

Pacific Piecemakers Quilt Guild (PPQG) kicks off its twentieth anniversary celebration with this annual quilt challenge and exhibit showcasing the creativity of quilters who will produce quilts, or quilt-related projects, based on their interpretation of this year's theme (and exhibit title), "Reflect on the Past, Stitch to the Future."

In addition to the challenge quilts, the show includes a display of "President's Quilts," quilts completed by past guild presidents from blocks prepared and given to them by members as a thank you for their service. A special collection of quilts by past members will also be exhibited, and a PowerPoint presentation on the "History of the Guild" and its achievements over the past 20 years will be broadcast during the opening reception.

A special "Memory Quilt" has been crafted to reflect guild accomplishments. Several guild members, using different quilt block techniques, have designed an individual block representing each guild activity. This quilt, including names of past, present, and in memoriam members, will be revealed at the Quilt Challenge.

As in past years, the quilters will prepare their outstanding hors d'oeuvres for the reception. These recipes, and many others provided by the quilters, have been collected into a celebration cookbook, "Quilters in the Kitchen." The book is available at the Arts Center, Four-Eyed Frog, Accents by the Sea, Attractions, The Loft in Sundstrom Mall, and Twofish Bakery for \$15 (tax included).

Larain Matheson, Encaustic Paintings & Kate Black, Fused Glass

Larain Matheson

In her second two-person show at the Dolphin Gallery, Larain Matheson continues to develop the artistic use of encaustic wax and oils she began using over eight years ago. Also known as hot wax painting, encaustic art uses heated bee's wax to which various pigments are added. Matheson says, "I fuse each layer of wax and oil with heat to create the beautiful transparencies that encaustic art produces. Sometimes I use 15 or more layers of wax fused to one another."

Her recent work reflects her love of and inspiration from nature. It spans from abstract forms she sees in the universe to realistic images. She strives to connect with the energy of the four elements – earth, air fire and water – that the classical world saw as the basic components of creation.

Matheson studied with Richard Diebenkorn and Lynn Foulkes while working on her Masters of Fine Art at UCLA, has taught art at several colleges, and teaches Encaustic Workshops at her Gualala studio. Her work has been published and displayed at many venues. She has even directed an award-winning documentary on the Huichol Indians. View the style and variety of her work at larainmathesonart.com.

Kate Black

Well known in Sonoma County, fused glass artist Kate Black displays post-modern pieces with striking welded frames. Her bold expressionistic pieces are suggestive of Miro and often contain a hint of Oriental influences.

Black learned her craft at SF State University, at Bennington College in Vermont and in NYC, then set aside her creative energies while attending medical school and raising a son. Then she discovered a way to work with cold glass fired in a kiln at home, allowing her to practice medicine by day and produce her art pieces at night.

In addition to her glass work Black paints in acrylics. Working out of her Santa Rosa studio, Black says, "My art is very cathartic. I never plan a piece or a painting beforehand. It's a very rapid, collage process that just jumps out of me. She also draws inspiration from music, especially jazz. "I want people to experience the rhythm in my art work."

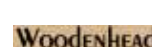
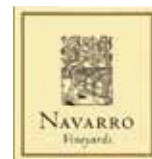
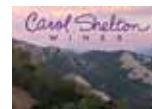

The Coastal Singers, conducted by Christina Chapman and accompanied by Don Krieger on the keyboard, perform "Something Wonderful" for this Mother's Day concert. The Ernest Bloch Bell Ringers conducted by Jeanne Jackson will join in the musical festivities as special guests.

The choir will perform songs from the 1950s and 1960s, and in a nod to Rodgers and Hammerstein and Lerner and Loewe, will highlight songs and medleys from The King and I and Camelot. Two toe-tapping, a cappella Beatles hits will be added to the mix. Together, the choir and the Bell Ringers will perform "Pachelbel's Canon in D." Jackson promises four more selections and an audience sing-along.

Opening performances include vocalists Linda Bostwick and Christina Chapman singing the "Skye Boat Song" accompanied by Marcia Carruthers on guitar and Wendy Bailey on Irish whistle.
