Journeys

Each year, Pacific Piecemakers Quilt Guild members are "challenged" to create a quilt that fits certain parameters.

For 2018, the theme is "Journeys" and although no specific style or size was required, each quilt must include a specified piece of blue Scrollscape Indigo fabric. Members were challenged to think about a journey (metaphorically, emotionally, physically, etc.) and to stitch and/or quilt their interpretation in fabric in one, two or three dimensions.

Quilts that will be exhibited include traditional, modern and art quilts, quilted clothing, and display a variety of styles and techniques. Depending on their design and/or purpose, quilts can be displayed on a bed, hung on a wall, framed, or worn.

The show is not juried nor judged, so it encourages creativity at all levels. "It is always a great thrill to see someone new to quilting/art quilts show their work alongside long-time quilters," says curator Cheryle Harris.

The members of Pacific Piecemakers Quilt Guild promote quilting locally and all along the Sonoma/Mendocino coast. PPQG offers monthly, educational programs, lectures, and workshops for quilters of all skill levels as well as opportunities for members to give back to their community using those skills.



Eric Wilder, drawings

A member of the Kashia Band of Pomo Indians, Eric Wilder grew up on the Kashia Reservation, the grandson of Essie Parrish, the last spiritual doctor of the Kashia, from whom he learned traditional teachings as well as songs, dances, and crafts.

Although interested in art from an early age, he says he “finally got a break” into a professional art career when he entered and won a comic book store’s drawing contest. From there, Wilder began creating graphic art for software companies and developing games for Lucas Art and MTV. His career in gaming drew on his abilities as an animator, character designer, storyboard artist, and concept artist in developing games like Stars Wars Phantom Menace and Celebrity Death Match.

Many members of the Mendonoma coastal community will have seen Wilder’s work in various galleries and shops and at Art in the Redwoods. With this exhibit, Wilder will introduce viewers to his most recent works of art.

Cliff Glover, ceramics

“Simple” and “direct” are words Cliff Glover uses to describe his pottery, which he hopes will appeal “to anyone who has ever worked hard at anything,” he says. “We are all looking for something to fulfill us.”

Glover does not see himself as doing “something special” but rather as a person who has worked very hard on his craft for decades, putting in the over 10,000 hours Malcolm Gladwell calls “deliberate practice” that is required to be skillful in any field.

“If someone asks me why I still make pots, I’m not sure I could come up with an honest answer: it’s just what I do,” Glover says, talking about the pottery he creates at his studio/gallery in Albion.

Glover uses stoneware and porcelain clays, prefers semi-matte and earth tone glazes, and fires in a gas kiln. His pottery is for everyday use — mugs, bowls, teapots, pitchers, etc. — the usual suspects.

Parker Quartet

Following a busy 2017-18 season that had the ensemble crossing North America for performances and residencies around the United States, including for the Schubert Club, Skidmore College, St. John's College, University of South Carolina, and Kansas City's Friends of Chamber Music, the Parker Quartet finished its fourth year in-residence at Harvard University. The Quartet's 2018-19 season continues its trademark, busy schedule with performances and residencies scheduled around the United States and Europe, including at the University of Iowa, the University of Chicago, the Wigmore Hall, and the University of South Carolina.

Renowned for its dynamic interpretations and polished, expansive colors, the group has rapidly distinguished itself as one of the preeminent ensembles of its generation. The Quartet has appeared at the world's most important venues since its founding in 2002.

Other recent highlights include the project "Schubert Effect" in collaboration with pianist Shai Wosner at the 92nd Street Y, the premiere of a new string quartet by American composer Augusta Read Thomas as part of the Quartet's annual four-concert series at Harvard University, and appearances at Carnegie Hall, the Library of Congress, the Slee Series in Buffalo, and New York's Lincoln Center Great Performers series. The Quartet also continues to be a strong supporter of violist Kim Kashkashian's project Music for Food by participating in concerts throughout the United States for the benefit of various food banks and shelters.


Jazz in the Autumn: "The Art of the Ballad"



Introducing Sharon Nickodem

October's Volunteer Spotlight shines on the forever young Sharon Nickodem.

You've seen her artwork, that's how it all began... Sharon Nickodem's familiarity with and love of Gualala Arts.

Introduced to our coast by her friend, Marion Patterson, Sharon began showing her work at Gualala Arts shortly after moving here in 2006. It wasn't long before she was winning awards for her black and white photography. The draw of being part of our artistic community, the wonderful Gualala Arts environment and the fact that Intel, the company she'd worked for, promoted and supported a volunteerism program that extended to retirees, all combined to convince Sharon she should volunteer. And volunteer she did -- and does!

In 2009, when Sharon was named Gualala Arts' Volunteer of the year, David 'Sus' Susalla, Executive Director of Gualala Arts, stated, "I cannot think of a volunteer who wears as many hats as Sharon here at Gualala Arts." It's as true today as it was then.

Sharon has volunteered at every Art in the Redwoods (which started before she had even moved to the coast!) She chaired the Exhibit Committee. She's run such programs as the Festival of Trees and Art Off the Wall. She's been a Gualala Arts Board Member. She is the Membership Director of the North Coast Artists' Guild. She's committed to growing the Gualala

"I give a lot to Gualala Arts," Sharon confirmed. "But I get so much back in return, it's a two-way street. Sus refers to our team as a family. It's true for so many of us," she said.

"Life is so good. I wake up happy... Getting involved, being engaged, it keeps you young!"


