

She didn't say my child or their children she said "OUR" children.



GUALALA ARTS CENTER | **SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT**

The following is an update of our current situation as of today, May 31, 2020. The doors are still closed to the public until June 12 (at the very earliest and perhaps into the late summer) to help mitigate the spread of COVID-19 as mandated by our county and state. We have cancelled dozens of our events, workshops, fundraisers & exhibits starting March 16 through the summer and some events in December already.

Some of the things that we ARE currently planning and doing to further our mission to promote the arts include:

- **We are using our creativity to reimagine our future to continue our mission** “to promote public interest and participation in the arts.”
- **Thankfully, we have signed a lease in a prime location in Cypress Village with some very generous landlords Richard & Kristine Thomure.** We are currently working on a rehabilitation plan of the space to meet our needs with current COVID regulations for a safe environment for our volunteers, artists and customers.
- **Art in the Redwoods is being reimaged!** We have a committee working to bring an online version of our 59th annual Art in the Redwoods to a device near you. At the center of the event will be **our members' visual art exhibit with 15 categories including a new “video” category.** Sponsors are being secured with hopes we can **continue to award \$5K in cash awards to winning artists.** We will also feature the performing arts offered by our community with new videos and “classic” performances from previous art in the redwoods. Culinary offerings will range from a curbside “Boxed Hat” fundraiser dinner, complete with optional zoom tables, entertainment, and the first right to purchase art as usual, and lovingly homemade pies & pizza for curbside pick up throughout the weekend from your favorite sweetshop and FOPO bakers.
- **We are excited to report that we have received 2 government loans and grants** to assist with some of our payroll costs this spring. Even though this is very welcomed and received. It only covers a very small fraction of our program and fundraising revenue losses, which is well over \$100K at this time.
- **THANK YOU! Your membership renewals and donations continue making a difference.** It helps to keep our staff employed, bills paid, organization strong, and planning and adapting to our future. Each dollar raised makes a difference! Thank You, Thank You, Thank You!!!!
- **Now meeting weekly - Gualala Arts Board of Directors has created a board subcommittee to research and implement new virtual art experiences** to continue our mission. If you have ideas or would like to get involved, please contact joan@sharkwerks.com
- **We continue to host a virtual exhibit titled, “Inferno: One Man’s Journey of the Camp Fire Through Art” by Artist Brian Holderman.** Works of Arts are for sale through our office by emailing Kendra info@gualalaarts.org.
- **Planning a new exhibit entitled Shelter from the Storm: Art in the Time of Covid-19.** We encourage artists & non-artists alike to create art while sheltering in their homes. We are looking forward to seeing what everyone has been working on to keep themselves busy while sheltering in their homes. Artists are posting using the hash tags #shelterfromthestormart & #gualalaarts
- **As always, our Sketches newsletter is available online,** but we have not mailed Sketches since March and may not into the future as warranted to save resources.

These are uncertain time for all of us to say the least. **The board and finance committees are making prudent decisions with our Gualala Arts assets.** If you find that you are in a position to help with the loss of our revenue stream, it would be greatly appreciated. We are looking to continue our mission – to promote public interest & participation in the arts since 1961 – well into the future.

The Dolphin Gallery has been a welcomed option for art lovers and gift shoppers for decades. In its original location—at the Anchor Bay Hardware Store—shoppers could find the works of local artists in an area of the store dubbed Gualala Arts Showroom. With art, including wood carvings of dolphins, the name was changed to The Dolphin, a name which has remained unchanged for 50 years.

The Dolphin moved from Anchor Bay to Sundstrom Mall in Gualala in the 1970s where it established itself as a much loved retail store featuring gifts, jewelry, ceramics, and

wood carvings. It also became (and continues to be) a hosting spot for new art exhibits. It's 40-year presence in downtown Gualala will continue, albeit in a new location, scheduled for opening this summer.

Supporting the Dolphin over the years has been a long list of volunteers who have donated their time, talent, energy and creativity. The warm reception visitors—locals and travelers alike—received over the years has given the Dolphin a deserved reputation as a welcoming spot on Mendocino County's south coast.

Escape. To the Global Harmony Sculpture Garden On the Grounds of Gualala Arts

Thousands of people have happily 'discovered' the Global Harmony Sculpture Garden at Gualala Arts. It's a public space where individuals, families and friends, locals and travelers alike can stroll and discover a treasure trove of art in the peaceful setting throughout the grounds of Gualala Arts. We've created a brochure to help our visitors enjoy the experience, and the grounds will be open Saturday, Sunday and Monday from Noon to 4 pm. 
1. Haiku Stone Path: Along the Easy Access Trail that runs from the far side of the DePrima terrace, through the forest and back to the picnic area, are river rocks collected by Arthur Horvath which have been engraved with the haiku of local writers. This traditional Japanese way of preserving poetry is the first such installation in the United States. Gualala Arts supported haiku since 1982 with groups, art exhibits and two books. Any published haiku writer, or admirer of haiku may choose to add a stone on the path.

2. Torii Gate: A torii is a traditional wooden archway placed at the entrance of or within a Shinto shrine, where it symbolically marks the transition from the profane to the sacred. This free-standing example was conceived, designed, and constructed using traditional hand tools to cut, shape, and plane it by Michael Anderson, who trained in Japan. It was a centerpiece for the Giri, Japanese American Exhibit in 2006 marking our debt of gratitude to the Japanese for the influence of their culture on ours. Elaine Jacob purchased the torii for installation on the Easy Loop Trail where it marks the transition from city or urban life to the sacred atmosphere of the redwood forest.

3. Serge Horse Hitching Post: This gift from the Yakuti people of the Sakha Republic in Russia is a memorial for the Russian settlers at Fort Ross during 1812-1842. Traditionally these carved posts are placed to show that a family has established itself in this area. During the installation in 2012, a delegation of artists including Fyodor Markov, the national artist of Russia, a shaman, and government officials attended and brought soil from Russia. Each year on June 21 we will gather around the Gualala Arts serge to celebrate Ysyakh -Ысыах - a commemoration of unity and mutual understanding through the friendship of people. This dialogue of cultures also represents the beginning of summer – the awakening of nature.


4. Meditation Grove: Thousands of years ago a huge redwood tree grew on the land that is now behind the Arts Center building. Around the base of this giant sprang up many sprouts which in turn became the redwood trees we see today. With time, the first tree died and decayed but the original roots stayed alive. Thus redwood trees are one of the oldest living organisms on earth. The visitor today is impressed by this circle and its void that testifies to the longevity of families. Diane Rasmussen created an enzo – circle picture – that also honors this aspect of our lives.

A New Exhibit at the New Dolphin

Coming in July

Barbara and Ling-Yen have shared exhibition space in the past and found their work compliment one another. Come see their journey into worlds of monotype prints, encaustic painting and handmade jewelry in an interpretation of literal and symbolic flight.



This show marks the sixth time Barbara Kelley has exhibited her monotype prints and original paintings at the Dolphin. These were created at her Moon Catcher Studio on The Sea Ranch or at her second work space in the Sonoma wine country. Talking about her pieces, Kelley says, “The central intention of my work is to create visual reflections of universal themes. I strive to create a visual language that is both evocative and straightforward.”

Ling-Yen Jones shares her personal vision of jewelry as not just ornamentation, but also as an artistic statement and symbolic representation of both the personal and the universal experience we all share. Each hand-crafted piece is a one of a kind creation, even when it is part of a series with repeated motifs. She wants her work to represent various themes such as new beginnings, changes, hope and personal growth. A brief survey of her extensive collection at her online virtual gallery confirms that she lives up to that ideal.
